About This Evening's Service


This evening's service combines two traditions: one older and one newer.

The older tradition is that of the Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols, a service of scripture readings interspersed with Christmas carols. The first Lessons and Carols was held in 1880 and planned by Edwin White Benson, bishop of Truro in Cornwall, England. Because the cathedral was still under construction, this first service was held in a barn – perhaps fitting for Christmas. Strange to imagine, but this service was rather radical when first conducted because Christmas carols were not considered appropriate for church worship. Carol singing was regarded as a secular practice, as neighbors sang carols while going around to each other's houses in holiday spirits. Lessons and Carols spread across England and became most popularly associated with King's College, Cambridge, which held its first Festival in 1918. Lessons and Carols at King's continues to be an annual tradition broadcast around the world every Christmas. Many Episcopal congregations in the U.S. observe Lessons and Carols as either an Advent or Christmas celebration.

The newer tradition we observe this evening is that of Longest Night services. Such services are designed to be an alternative or supplement to traditional Christmas services. The purpose is to acknowledge and validate feelings of sadness, despair, hopelessness, powerlessness, and doubt – even or especially during a season associated with joy and merriment.

Our service this evening intersperses seven scriptures of lament with hymns of longing and hope based on seven sources of suffering. For each, we will light a candle and lift our prayers. At the conclusion of our service, we will offer anointing with laying on of hands and sacred oil.

Whatever feelings you carry this evening and this season, tonight's service is for you: for the validation of your struggles, for the comfort that such struggles are woven into our most ancient wisdom, for the healing that comes from bearing suffering with others. We cannot always fix what afflicts us, but knowing that we don't walk alone makes all the difference.

Bidding

Beloved friends in Christ, in this season of Advent, it is our care and delight to prepare ourselves to hear again the message of the Angels, and in heart and mind to go even unto Bethlehem, to see the Babe lying in a manger.

But that road to Bethlehem is often too dark to traverse, and the joys of this holy season are obscured by distresses of mind and spirit by death and grief by isolation and loneliness by injury and illness by oppression and injustice by war and violence and by the compassion and helplessness we feel for all those who suffer in this world.

On this longest night, may Almighty God bless us with grace; Christ give us the joys of everlasting life; and unto the fellowship of the citizens above may the King of Angels bring us all.

The First Candle


We light this candle to remember those who are captive to the powers which corrupt and destroy God's beloved creation, those lost in the night of addiction; those who suffer from untreated mental illness; those for whom short days bring depression; and those who, for whatever reasons, struggle to feel the joy they long for during this season.

O come, Emmanuel, And disperse the gloomy clouds of night.

Lesson from Psalm 69

Save me, O God, for the waters have risen up to my neck. I am sinking in deep mire, and there is no firm ground for my feet. I have come into deep waters, and the torrent washes over me. I have grown weary with my crying; my throat is inflamed; my eyes have failed from looking for my God. Let not the torrent of waters wash over me, neither let the deep swallow me up; do not let the Pit shut its mouth upon me. Lesson from Lamentations 3




for he does not willingly afflict or grieve anyone.

But you, O LORD, endure for ever, and your Name from age to age.


In the beginning, O LORD, you laid the foundations of the earth, and the heavens are the work of your hands;

Lesson from Jeremiah 14

Let my eyes run down with tears night and day, and let them not cease, for the maiden daughter—my people is struck down with a crushing blow, with a very grievous wound. If I go out into the field, look those killed by the sword! And if I enter the city, look those sick with famine! For both prophet and priest ply their trade throughout the land, and have no knowledge.... Why have you struck us down so that there is no healing for us? We look for peace, but find no good; for a time of healing, but there is terror instead. We acknowledge our wickedness, O Lord, the iniquity of our ancestors, for we have sinned against you. Do not spurn us, for your name's sake; do not dishonor your glorious throne; remember and do not break your covenant with us. Can any idols of the nations bring rain? Or can the heavens give showers? Is it not you, O Lord our God? We set our hope on you, for it is you who do all this.

We light this candle to remember those whose hearts are heavily burdened by the sinful state of the world and the suffering born by so many; for all of us when we lose the light of hope in the nighttime of this mortal life.

O come, Emmanuel, And ransom your captive people.

from Isaiah 9 Lesson

The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness—on them light has shined. You have multiplied the nation, you have increased its joy; they rejoice before you as with joy at the harvest, as people exult when dividing plunder.

For the yoke of their burden, and the bar across their shoulders, the rod of their oppressor, you have broken as on the day of Midian. For all the boots of the tramping warriors and all the garments rolled in blood shall be burned as fuel for the fire.

For a child has been born for us, a son given to us; authority rests upon his shoulders; and he is named Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. Laying On of Hands and Anointing


